

WHEREAS House Bill 477 is an official English bill which would require state agencies to conduct official business in English – although state agencies already do so;

and WHEREAS according to the United States Census Bureau, in the year 2000, nearly 94% of Ohioans ONLY speak English, highlighting a serious deficiency in our state's ability to compete in the global marketplace;

and WHEREAS just two years ago, the Speaker of the Ohio House of Representatives cited economic concerns when stopping a similar measure in the previous General Assembly;

and WHEREAS many American citizens, including the Amish, Puerto Ricans, Samoans, Alaskan Inuit, American Indians and many other Native Americans do not speak English as their first language;

and WHEREAS House Bill 477 threatens to abridge the civil and human rights of lawful residents and American citizens who do not, or have not yet, acquired English-language proficiency;

BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

The Ohio Latino Affairs Commission is hereby OPPOSED to House Bill 477, because it does not change the status quo; is completely unnecessary; sends the wrong message to businesses, foreign investment, and those learning a foreign language; and because provisions like it have already been demonstrated to unlawfully deny rights and services by those who misinterpret its purpose to those who rightfully should be served.
